A Concern About the Distribution of the Covid Vaccine

My friend Cynthia, age 82, who lives in Geneva, Switzerland recently received a letter inviting her to be vaccinated. She went to a place near her home where the National Guard ran the operation using large emergency trailers. All went quickly and smoothly.

Switzerland is not a Communist country. It is a competent one. Here in the US we are having our problems.

I am 76. I would like to be vaccinated. I called my doctor, but he could do nothing for me. The vaccine is being distributed by Maine Health, the private hospital chain that owns all the hospitals in southern Maine. My doctor doesn't work for them, he is independent, so at first even he could not get a shot - Maine Health was reserving the vaccine for its employees only.

The Maine CDC website directs me to call Maine Health at 877-780-7545, the same number for all their hospitals. I called ten days ago and listened to a recording saying that I should try again tomorrow. Two days later I got through to a robot that took my phone number and my date of birth (but not my name) and told me that it would call me. Until today I had not heard back. I tried a couple more times. Still no reply. Then this morning a friend who knew I was trying to get the vaccine (and whose wife is a doctor) called me and urged me, right now, call the number again. I did, got the robot and left the same information as before. Three minutes later the phone rang and it was a human being, a polite woman from Maine Health, who gave me an appointment for next week to get my shot at the Samoset. I am grateful, but wondering what the heck is going on.

I wonder to what extent Maine Health is prioritizing its own patients. I wonder to what extent inside information gets you ahead in the line. I wonder to what extent the people who know the answers to these questions prefer not to talk about it.

A little more transparency would be nice.

Unorthodox

I received a pamphlet in the mail, 20 pages of dark colors on heavy glossy paper.

GEOENGINEERING: A CHRONICLE OF INDICTMENT. Exposing The Global Climate Engineering Cover-Up. Fact & Photo Summary.

It is mostly weird sky photos proving that chemicals are being sprayed into our atmosphere by thousands of airplanes. I have a friend who believes this, so had a general idea of the evidence.

My own view is that it is total nonsense, but the pamphlet inspired me to look up Climate Engineering in Wikipedia. The article said that global climate engineering was an idea being discussed among climate scientists who are concerned about global warming, but was, so far, not shown to be viable. The idea that climate engineering is being secretly put into practice on a grand scale is dismissed in two sentences. "Some extremists have proposed that there are secret government actions implementing geoengineering on a large scale, affecting weather to produce winter, or cooling, or large fires, or other detrimental effects. There is no evidence to substantiate these unorthodox claims."

I was struck by this use of the word unorthodox in such a clearly negative sense. I have been used to its being used more like "well its unorthodox, but..." - worth considering, in other words. But now it seems that unorthodox means incorrect, and orthodox means correct.

We are talking about science, or what is called science, of course. We all believe in science. We believe in it as an ideal, we believe in the scientific method, in intellectual honesty, in objective experiment, and open mindedness. We agree, now, with Galileo that the sun, not the earth, is at the center of the solar system, and we regret that he was forced to recant this unorthodox view on the command of the orthodoxy of his time. There is even more to regret, much more damage to our progress, much more cruelty, done in the name of orthodoxy. My friend Sergio took me to a monument in the Campo de' Fiori in Rome where Giovanni Bruno was burned at the stake in 1600. Bruno proposed that the stars were distant suns surrounded by their own planets. A highly unorthodox view at the time. Unlike Galileo, Bruno did not recant.

I reject the geoengineering conspiracy theory, not because it is heresy, but because the evidence I have seen is not convincing, and because my experience tells me that a global conspiracy of that enormous magnitude would be impossible to keep secret.

We are entering on a new era of orthodoxy, now political rather than religious, an era in which the mob has sway, and orthodoxy, rather than reason, carries the day. Let's stand up for reason.
