## Police Review Committee

City Councilor Nate Davis sent us the following:

I've pasted below the text of the order creating a police review committee upon which the Rockland City Council will vote (subject to amendment) this coming Monday evening. If this is of interest to you, please read the order carefully and offer any feedback (or support, or criticism) that you might wish. The best way to offer feedback is to physically attend our meeting at 6pm on Monday at City Hall and offer your comments during the public comment period. Alternately, you can e-mail feedback to City Manager Tom Luttrell at [tluttrell@rocklandmaine.gov](mailto:tluttrell@rocklandmaine.gov) and request that it be read into the public record.

This will be the primary substantive vote that launches (or does not launch) the committee, so if you do want to offer input, this is the time to do it!

### IT IS HEREBY ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL AS FOLLOWS:

THAT there is hereby established an ad-hoc committee to investigate ways to improve community policing in Rockland and to report recommendations to the City Council on any actions necessary to facilitate such improvements; and  
The committee shall be comprised of seven (7) residents, representing as many different opinions as possible. Once formed, the committee shall elect a Chair from among its voting membership, and shall determine the procedures that the committee shall follow in the completion of its assigned tasks. The committee may have consultants representing various partner agencies and other users serving as non-voting members, and the Mayor or their designee shall serve as a non-voting ex-officio member. Additionally the Police Chief (or designee) and the Fire Chief (or designee) shall serve as non-voting members. The committee shall work closely with the city administration on all recommendations. If necessary the committee may hire a facilitator to help with research and to moderate meetings. It is expected that 12 months may be needed to accomplish the review. If more time is needed, the council may grant it. Once the work of the committee is completed, it shall be dissolved.

The committee is tasked with the hard work of reviewing the city's policing policies and practices to investigate possible improvements. Issues to tackle include (but are not limited to):

- Department hiring practices - Recruitment, qualifications, wages and compensation;
- Training - Types offered/required;
- Officer wellness - Physical and mental health for RPD staff, ensuring a positive working environment;
- Service center- What size and scope of services are right for Rockland?
- Should there be a standing police committee, and if so, what roles should it have?
- Mental Health – How to best provide services, specialized training, partner agencies, resources;
- Anonymous input – Protect vulnerable communities, encourage important feedback, minimize potential for false reports;
- Data – Minorities, biases, arrest data, crime rates, use-of-force data, time of day statistics, etc. How has policing in Rockland changed in 20 years;
- Duplications in local services - Possible collaborative or alternate providers for various community needs, cost/benefit of overlap (i.e., County Sheriff and RPD);
- Transparency - Data collection and sharing with the public, including crime and call stats, complaints and disciplinary proceedings, body camera footage, interactions with the public, etc.;
- Substance abuse and addiction - Specialized training, partner agencies, local resources;
- Use of force - clarity of policy, disengagement or de-escalation policy; and
- Traffic enforcement - Strategies and frequency of enforcement, speeding, pedestrian safety, dangerous intersections, noisy vehicles.

Much needed rain and cool weather descends on our mid-coast providing relief from oppressive heat and humidity. Some neighbors are using their wood stoves to keep the chill at bay.

I fed the crows peanuts that they love and which won't melt in the rain. One young crow lighted on the ramp railing outside our kitchen window. We were about two feet apart. It's excellent peripheral vision caused it to turn toward me and we stared at each other for a while and then it flew away. I wonder what it thought of our visit.

Few Covid cases in our mid-coast Maine have been reported. People around the country getting the coronavirus have not been vaccinated. Cases in southern states and some rural areas are where the pockets of hospitalizations and deaths occur.

The coronavirus has reminded me to fill out my Maine Advance Directive with my long time family doctor and friend. No treatments, feeding tubes, resuscitations for me if I have an illness that will not get better, cannot be cured and have a terminal condition. It's the compassionate thing to do for oneself and especially for one's next of kin, so that they're not left hanging with little or no information to follow.

The Fourth of July holiday was rainy and cold. So was Labor Day last Year. I wonder what 2021's Labor Day will bring? Someone did fire off lots of fireworks in Snow Marine Park that lit up the South End for all to enjoy. Earlier there was community celebration on Rockland's Main Street. Although fully vaccinated last February, I'm still not ready to venture into packed crowded areas.

The other day I heard what I thought was a nearby drone. I went outside to see a guy in a powered parachute (PPC). He was sitting in a motorized cart soaring way overhead, controlling distance and height with the parafoil. I had never seen one in person. He was high over rooftops and being applauded by his land bound friends.

After awhile, he landed with ease. It looked like fun but too risky for my palate. But who am I to say? 82 year-old Wally Funk, a female American pilot, who once trained to be an astronaut, will soon ride with Jeff Bezos into space. It will be her dreams come true after six decades. Who says bravery diminishes with age? You go girl!

We've had three family reunions with relatives geographically near and far - from California to Tennessee to Florida. It was beyond wonderful to see relatives after more than a year and some much longer than that.

On the actual 4th of July on Monday, a close friend brought her big batch of homemade vanilla ice cream using a hand crank, homemade rich whipped cream, toasted walnuts and the decadent hot fudge sauce made by the famous Herrell's ice cream emporium in Northampton, MA where we went to grad school. These were served over my husband's equally famous brownies. The four of us gorged ourselves into a kind of gourmet oblivion to celebrate the wider freedom of vaccinations and re-joining the world of socializing after such a dreary drought.
