Independent Candidate for Governor to Speak at St. George Grange Hall





Sam Hunkler, a family doctor from Beals, has qualified to be on the November ballot as an independent candidate for Governor. He will be coming to the Rockland area on Wednesday, June 15 to give a short talk entitled "A Perspective of Healing," followed by a discussion at the St. George Grange Hall. The talk is applicable to personal and community

The event will begin at 7 pm and be followed by an opportunity to meet the candidate. Prior to the talk, Sam will be interviewed from 5 to 6 pm on the Rockland Metro Show on WRFR, at 93.3 fm and online at wrfr.org and simulcast on Maine Coast TV, cable channel 7 and online at mainecoast.tv.

Hunkler, who prefers to be called Sam rather than Dr. Hunkler, grew up in a small town in Ohio, the seventh son of a telephone repairman. He first came to Maine while he was still in

high school, to visit his brother who was serving at Loring Air Base. After college Sam served in the Peace Corps in Kenya, where he met his wife Kelly, a Mainer.

After he finished medical school Sam and Kelly moved to Greene, Maine while he did his residency at Central Maine Medical Center in Lewiston. He then spend 3 years in the Indian Health Service in Alaska as a National Health Service Scholar before returning to Maine and settling in Beals. He "retired from the medical system" in 2021, but continues a small local practice.

Sam says his interest in politics began with a suggestion from his father while he was still a student. "It stuck with me" he says. Though he chose a medical career, in his senior year in high school he was president of the student council, president of his class, president of the National Honor Society, president of the Key Club, captain of the football team, and artist of the year.

"Stand With Sam" is the slogan of his campaign. He says he is running for office to lead Maine on an independent path, away from partisan bickering and special-interest agendas, and toward government by and for the people. His message is "let's find common ground with common sense for the common good."

A very unusual aspect of his campaign is that he is taking no money from anyone. He says "I am accepting no campaign donations and will be beholden to no person or special interest. I will selffinance my standing with the goal of spending less than \$5000, excluding travel."

The two other candidates on the ballot, Democrat Janet Mills and Republican Paul LePage, have each already raised over a million dollars. Sam's plan is to to enlist the direct help of Mainers - to make signs, organize speaking engagements, and spread the word. He invites people to contact him via his web page, StandWithSam2022.org

The St. George Grange Hall is at 32 Wiley's Corner Road. The candidates talk at 7 pm on Wednesday, June 15 will be his first campaign appearance. He plans to speak at grange halls around the state over the summer and fall.

Not sure, what are future plans for the program? If asked, more guests and more of a fixed format.


What is your favorite book? Why is it your favorite?

Maine CDC announced Maine leads the nation ("Dirigo") in second booster shots with 30% of residents getting their second jab and 74.23% fully vaccinated. Complacency is dangerous. National sources cite a 30% increase in US cases.
